#### Reasons for Change in Appropriation

This appropriation decreased by \$1.538 million to \$31.902 million for 2022/23 due to a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$3.680 million to reflect the allocation of Ministry overheads in 2022/23.

The decrease was partially offset by:

- an increase of \$1.794 million to ensure core justice services are maintained by improving remuneration for Ministry of Justice employees
- an expense transfer of \$250,000 from 2021/22 to 2022/23 to reflect the Sexual Violence Legislation Act 2021 implementation activities, and
- a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$98,000 for the consolidation of all rostering functions to legal aid administration.

#### Elimination of Family Violence and Sexual Violence (M104) (A600)

#### Scope of Appropriation

This appropriation is limited to leading a whole-of-government approach to prevent, address and eliminate family violence and sexual violence, as well as related services and support to Ministers.

#### Reasons for Change in Appropriation

This appropriation decreased by \$253,000 to \$20.515 million for 2022/23 due to an expense transfer of \$600,000 from 2022/23 to 2023/24 to reflect the engagement costs with communities that would enable the collective implementation and monitoring of Te Aorerekura (the national strategy to eliminate family violence and sexual violence) and its related action plan.

This was partially offset by an increase of \$347,000 to ensure core justice services are maintained by improving remuneration for employees.

This appropriation is limited to the provision of property and shared services to other agencies in Christchurch.

This appropriation increased by \$4.469 million to \$39.469 million for 2022/23 due to:

- a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$2.211 million to reflect the increased depreciation costs as a result of the revaluations of the Christchurch Justice and Emergency Service Precinct
- additional funding of \$2.203 million for capital charge as a result of the revaluation of the Christchurch Justice and Emergency Service Precinct as at 30 June 2022
- an increase of \$36,000 to ensure core justice services are maintained by improving remuneration for Ministry of Justice employees, and
- a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$19,000 to reflect the agency contribution for dedicated use of a new meeting room in the Christchurch Justice and Emergency Services Precinct.

- a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$2.705 million to reflect the allocation of Ministry overheads in 2022/23
- an increase of \$1.289 million to ensure core justice services are maintained by improving remuneration for Ministry of Justice employees
- an expense transfer of \$1.200 million from 2021/22 to 2022/23 for the public engagement and work on the advancing electoral law review
- an expense transfer of \$400,000 from 2021/22 to 2022/23 for the public engagement on the national action plan on racism
- an expense transfer of \$241,000 from 2021/22 to 2022/23 for the Ministry to response the work of the Abuse in Care Royal Commission of Inquiry
- a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$200,000 to reflect the agency contribution to the justice legal needs survey project, and
- a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$96,000 to reflect the agency contribution to the Tokelau law and justice sector reform project.

The increase was partially offset by an expense transfer of \$700,000 from 2022/23 to 2023/24 to reflect the timing of hearings of Te Rau o te Tika: justice system kaupapa inquiry.

Note 1 - The standard has increased for 2022/23 by 3,000 hours to align to the actual hours that have been completed over the last two financial years.

Note 2 - PAL 1 cases are the less severe charges usually heard by a judge alone. PAL is the Provider/Lawyer Approval Level of a case. Cost accounted for using criminal legal aid fixed fee rates.

Note 3 - The standard has increased for 2022/23 by \$200 to align with the recent changes to hourly rates paid to legal aid lawyers. Any further changes to recruitment, retention, the legal aid fixed fee framework, provider hourly rates, court delays, changes in judicial behaviour or charge input will impact this measure.

Note 4 - The standard has decreased for 2022/23 by 3,000 cases to align to the actual number of new cases accepted over each of the past two financial years. These case numbers have been affected by COVID-19 impacts and recruitment and staff retention challenges.

# Reasons for Change in Appropriation

This appropriation increased by \$2.916 million to \$45.165 million for 2022/23 due to:

- an increase of \$2.514 million to ensure core justice services are maintained by improving remuneration for Ministry of Justice employees, and
- an expense transfer of \$500,000 from 2021/22 to 2022/23 to reflect the Sexual Violence Legislation Act 2021 implementation activities.

This was partially offset by a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$98,000 for the consolidation of all rostering functions to legal aid administration.

Note 1 - These performance indicators have been removed for 2022/23 due to reporting on these areas being covered by performance indicators for the Provision of Protective Fiduciary Services appropriation.

#### Reasons for Change in Appropriation

This appropriation increased by \$688,000 to \$64.945 million for 2022/23 due to:

- a net increase of \$1.817 million for victim assistance scheme grants, with an increase of \$1.456 million for victims of the masjidain attack and \$361,000 for victims of the of the Whakaari/White Island eruption
- an expense transfer of \$500,000 from 2021/22 to 2022/23 for the carry forward of underspent funding from the offender levy, and
- a net increase of \$298,000 to reflect an expense transfer of \$548,000 from 2021/22 to 2022/23 for Whakaorangia te Mana Tangata to support Māori offenders, victims and their whānau, offset by a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$250,000 for the post implementation activities that will be provided under the Ministry of Justice departmental activities.

The decrease was partially offset by:

- a fiscally neutral adjustment of \$1.777 million to transfer funding for services providers for victims and perpetrators of family violence that are paid through other appropriations in Vote Courts and Vote Corrections, and
- a fiscally neutral transfer of \$150,000 to reflect the co-government support for the mana ōrite partnership between Ināia Tonu Nei and the Justice Sector Leadership Board to improve justice sector outcomes for Māori.
